# FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

A song runs through my head from time to time, and it's found in the musical version of The Lion King. The refrain is simple: "BE PREPARED." November is a month of preparation for me. We prepare to remember the saints on the first Sunday in November. Festivals will begin to get us in the holiday spirit. Families will plan meals for Thanksgiving. We will prepare the church with hanging of the greens. It's truly a time of preparation.

Think about it this way: preparation is like a rehearsal. On Sunday morning, the Chancel Choir or the Glory Handbells don't just get up and sight-read their music that day. It takes weeks (sometimes months) of practice in order for a piece of music to be ready to offer to God. When Lincoln Trail College Theater kicks off *Annie* this month, they didn't just walk on stage for opening night and begin to sing, dance, and act; they have been rehearsing for months.

The Christian life requires preparation, practice, and rehearsal. We grow deeper in our relationship with God when we practice spiritual disciplines - prayer, reading Scripture, worship, partaking in sacraments, being in Sunday school or Bible study, feeding the hungry or visiting the sick. We find ourselves in trouble when we haven't prepared for Christian life and suddenly dive in (it's like saying that we want to read the whole Bible, beginning with Genesis, and we give up by the time we reach Leviticus, mostly because we haven't practiced reading Scripture). Preparation gives us endurance, and makes it possible for us to live out our faith in ways that give us life.

I want to encourage you to join me in practice and preparation this month. As the clock turns back, as the seasonal gatherings commence, take some time to prepare and practice. Maybe for the season of Advent (which for us, we will begin observing on November 26), consider taking part in a Sunday school class for those four weeks, or helping with NOW bagging, or singing carols at an area nursing home. Of course, this month's edition of the Herald offers you many opportunities to help First UMC be prepared for all that is to come, so read with an eye to participate, and see what God does to prepare you for what lies ahead.
